

Club's photo calendar project is now available for sale. As noted on the poster copy at the left, the photo theme is the historic schools of Montgomery County. While not the very first school structures, which were usually one room log affairs that seldom varied in size and design, these buildings were of more durable materials and accomodated an increasing population of students in several and more spacious rooms, while providing additional space for related educational activities as well as a community gathering place. In their time, they also served as the geographic reference for ones location in the greater community, and, generally, they all had a personalized name reflecting community, major family presence or quaint individual storys. While no one knew exactly where school #7 could be found [probably several], they could tell you exactly how to get from where you were to your Uncle John's farm, a mile West of "Sixty Cent" School!



New Resources At The Library

Local History Librarian

Ancestry.com is now available for use on computers in the Crawfordsville District Public Library. It has many of the same features as Heritage Quest and many of its own. The censuses that are on both have different errors in indexing and Ancestry does not require that you misspell it right to find it. There is a Soundex searching on Ancestry. The censuses that are not indexed on Heritage Quest are indexed on Ancestry. I find that I get far more than what I asked for and I am not yet a fan. There is a difference in the census image quality between the two for some images. It is recommended that both be consulted if the one being used is poor. The fully indexed Ancestry can yield the roll or ED and page number needed to access the image for unindexed Heritage Quest census years.

We now have on CD ROM Heads of Families at the First Census of the United States Taken in the year 1790. These are images of index books to the first census. Rare maps of the time are also included. With out much difficulty I was able to find my ancestor Eleazer Wheelock in Warwick Town, Hampshire Co., Massachusetts. The name of head of household is indexed and then listed with the number of free white males 16 years old and over [which includs the head of household], free white males under 16, free white females, other free persons and slaves. Wheelock's 1790 household consisted of 1 free white male 16 or over, 1 free white male under 16 and 6 free white females. If I can make it work almost anybody can.





Jack and Dottie Pickett Donate Historic Pictures

The picture collection belonged to Jack's grand mother, Gertrude Rosine Williams [b. April 23,1886 in Ladoga, IN; d. May 29,1953]. She married Robert Henry Wilson [b. 1859 in Montezuma, IN; d. June 24, 1937] 12/25/1888 in Crawfordsville. Both died at 6013 College Ave. in Indianapolis, IN. The pictures are all friends and most are cousins. Her family lines are Harshbarger, Myers, Stephens and Williams. Since all of the families had 6 to 12 children and they all had 6 to 12 etc., the trail ends up with mucho cousins.

The pictures sat in a big box in grand mother's closet and stayed there until my aunt [her other daughter] died. We cleaned out the house and my sister grabbed them and put them under her bed in and then under her bed when she moved to . She didn't have a clue as to who anyone was. When we moved her into a senior citizens apartment complex, I grabbed them and hopefully our genealogy and Crawfordsville District Public Library will bloom for ever. Dottie and I are so pleased that we found a place for them that was as excited as we are about the collection.

Here is a brief descripton of the collection: Fifty identified carte de visitie and photographs, several in the 1860 time period. Three have Civil War Revenue Tax Stamps on the back. Four are unidentified daquerrotypes and ambrotype images. There are seventeen unidentified tintypes from around Ladoga, IN. Family surnames mentioned in this file are Graybill, Kessler, VanCleave, Frantz, Williams, Wilson, etc.

These pictures can be seen on the library website at http://www.cdpl.lib.in.us. Go to the left hand side of the screen and click on Local History. This will take you to the Local History Databases. Go down to the Image database and for the folder question put in p237*. This will pull up all of the picture images as thumbnails with information about each picture. If you click on the path under a thumbnail, you can view a much larger picture image.



A Civil War soldier's letter home - - - original by Wm G Keys

Camp at Murfreesboro, Tennessee April 6th 1863




Dear wife, Your letter of April 1 st has come to hand. I was sincerly rejoiced to learn that you are in better health at home than you had been. The weather here was cold, quite cold about the first of April: not so bad I suppose as it was with you but very disagreable for the time of year. It is cool and blustering yet. My health is good and our friends here are pretty well just now, there is not much sickness in the Regiment least as far as I know. For they left five days ago on a expedition, and have not got back yet. It is said they will not be back for four or five days yet. I am glad to know that you got the money I sent. I thought it would go safely. I earnestly hope and trust that Mr. Whites opinion about the close of the war may prove true. I think there is no doubt but what the rebels are reduced to terrible extremity: and that there is great dissatisfaction amongst them: While our boys seem as lively, and hopeful and in as good spirits as ever if not better. How soon the army will move from here I could not pretend to say. I would guess however that it would not for a few weeks yet. It is said that our Division will remain here when the army moves. that we shall have to hold the forts that are being built about here. I think that is quite likely though I dont know it will be so. It is rumored here today that the City of Charleston has been taken by our army in South Carolina. It will be quite a blow to the rebels if it is true. If not true yet. I hope it will be soon. It has been one of the meanest places in the rebel dominions and I want to know that it it brought down. The Rebels have as we learn been chased out of Kentucky again. I want to see them chased out of this state. As to lending the money or keeping it yourself, I want you to do just as you think best. As to the renting any of the land if father can rent out the field west of the orchard to someone that will tend it well. I think it would be best to do so. I think you had better keep the clover for the use of your own stock. I dont think of any thing more just now that I ought to write more than today, that I too am still trying to do right as well as I can, I am glad to know that you are determined to hold out faithful. May our Heavenly Father enable us both so to do, is the sincere desire of your affectionate husband.

It is anticipated that the stone will be set before the year's end. The new entry drive from the road is yet to be done. All veteran's names and stone pictures have been uploaded to findagrave.com. You might wish to view this web site to see the results. Update of DAR and library records for the additional 30 burials have yet to be done. In addition to the work progress, we have received new signage for mounting at the road or at the cemetery entrance gate. I would ask the membership to let me know which location you think is best.
