






**EXPLORE THE CARNEGIE MUSEUM** during the **6th Annual Summer at the Museum program!** Now that school is out, children, pre-school through early teens, are encouraged to sign up for this fun and free program at the Carnegie Museum. Five visits to the museum during the summer will allow them to complete the five color coded sets of activities. Bonus activities are available for those who finish early. Participants can complete an activity set with each visit and earn a prize for each one completed. Activities vary by age, with the younger kids doing different activities than the older ones. All answers can be found in the museum and the museum staff are always available to give hints and/or explanations.

Kids visit the museum on their own schedule, complete the activities (independently or with an adult) and earn small prizes. The **Summer at the Museum** program is free and children can sign up at any time during the summer. The program runs through mid-August and includes learning about local people such as Arachnologist Greta Binford, Private William Bratton, Puzzlemaster Will Shortz, Astronaut Joe Allen, Author Janet Lambert, and many others who have called Montgomery County their home.



**Summer at the Museum** activities include puzzles, scavenger hunts, origami, and much more. The current exhibit **Mapped Out** is featured with students surveying parts of the museum, drawing their own maps, and finding locations and information throughout the museum. Admission to the Carnegie Museum is free and the museum is stroller and wheelchair accessible. In June and July, the Museum will be open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 am to 5 pm and other times by appointment. In August, we'll return to our normal hours of Wednesday through Saturday, 10 am to 5 pm.

**MAPPED OUT**—An exhibit on the history, science, and art of maps, cartography, surveying, and much more. See both current and historic maps of Crawfordsville, Montgomery County, Indiana, the United States, and the World. 


# The Legacy of Tuttle Schools



The first Tuttle School was built in 1906. The architect for the building was W.F. Sharpe and the cost for the land and construction of the building was \$30,000 (not adjusted for inflation). It was built for the purpose of educating kids grades K-6. The school was named after Dr. Joseph F. Tuttle who was president of Wabash College from 1862 until 1892. He was noted for his public speaking ability, his contributions to the literary field, and for his outstanding involvement in the community.

Due to a rising school population, in 1958 the city of Crawfordsville deemed it necessary to enlarge the educational infrastructure. The plan called for the schools of John Beard, Laura Hose, Meredith Nicholson, and Mollie B. Hoover (all elementary) to be enlarged. The plan also called for the demolition of Tuttle School and the erection of a junior high school in its place (grades 7-9). In 1960, at the cost of \$1,995,000 (\$15,978,332 when adjusted for inflation), Tuttle School was torn down and Tuttle Middle School was built on the same location. This building will be demolished in June 2014.


In 1961 and 1991, school based time capsules were created. Both time capsules were recently unearthed and feature a glimpse into the history of the school and student life at Tuttle, as well as various newspaper clippings and photos pertaining to the construction and opening of Tuttle Middle School. These items and many more will be on display at the Carnegie Museum beginning in August as students head to the new Crawfordsville Middle School for the very first time.





This past winter, the Carnegie Museum of Montgomery County was selected as an official **MAKING STUFF** outreach site!

NOVA collaborated with 75 sites nationwide to provide the materials and media to “make stuff” Colder, Wilder, Faster and Safer through a series of projects that include hands-on activities and design challenges based on the four themes from their MAKING STUFF series. The Carnegie Museum was the only site in Indiana to be selected for this program. The museum hosted our first Making Stuff event in the spring, and we’ll continue to incorporate the Making Stuff ideas and activities into museum programming in the future.

This summer, the Carnegie Museum will host *Wilder* and *Colder* Wednesdays and *SAFER* and *Faster* Thursdays. All summer Making Stuff programs will take place from 2 to 4 pm.

### Tuttle Time Capsules

Items from the 1961 & 1991 Tuttle Time Capsules will be on display at the Carnegie Museum beginning Saturday, August 2, 2014.

### Officer Russell Baldwin Display

This exhibit will be the first in a series honoring our former and current members of local law enforcement and emergency responders. This exhibit focuses on the Crawfordsville Police Department and commemorates one of their own who lost his life in the line of duty 40 years ago this August.

### **Who is a Hoosier?** on loan from the Indiana Historical Society.


Many people ask “What is a Hoosier?” and Indiana natives take pride in their nickname. The makeup of Indiana’s communities has changed over time, molded by the contributions of a wide range of ethnic groups. Today, people with many different backgrounds identify themselves as Hoosiers. The comings and goings of newcomers to this state, through immigration or migration, created the Indiana we know today and will continue to shape its future. Pioneer settlers, nineteenth-century immigrants, and modern arrivals alike experienced the universal struggle to build a life in a new place while balancing traditional values with loyalty to a new country. In this traveling exhibit, maps and infographics highlight the statistical impact of changing ethnic groups, while photographs from various IHS collections and institutions all over the state bring to life the personal stories of immigration. *Who is a Hoosier?* is made possible by Kroger. This exhibit will run August 6th through August 30th at the Carnegie Museum of Montgomery County.

### Coming in 2015—Yount’s Mill Archaeology exhibit

The Carnegie Museum is partnering with Mark Groover, Ph.D. archaeologist; Ronald V. Morris, Ph.D. historian of Ball State University; and Yount’s Mill Inn to conduct an archaeological dig at the site of Yount’s Woolen Mill and Boarding House, located just off of State Road 32 near the Yountsville Bridge. The Ball State students, in addition to doing the archaeology work, will also present their findings in an exhibit at the Carnegie Museum in 2015.



